Pastor's Paragraphs

THE RESULT OF EASTER: CHURCH!

During this Easter season, of course, many people will be thinking about the resurrection of Jesus. That which they may not realize is that Paul spoke of the resurrection as a *vision* or *apparition* through which Jesus was able to communicate with his followers and to leave them with awareness of what seemed to be an impossible possibility: That Jesus not only had *survived* death, he also was able still to relate to his followers with palpable intimacy! If the claims of those early followers are true, any seemingly "impossible possibility" such as that needs to take center stage in our awareness during this important season; and, for us at CCM, it definitely will. I'll be sharing my own *personal experience*, not hearsay, as well as my understanding of the biblical accounts, although some of those experiences may not be what you are accustomed to hearing on Easter Sunday. I hope, however, that my experience-based insights will be able to help us all move closer to penetrating what we might call the spiritual mystery to top *all* spiritual mysteries. But that is for Easter Sunday!

In this article, I want to address a topic that I have never heard mentioned in any church during the Easter season, despite its obvious importance: the fact that Easter and the coming into being of the spiritual community we call church are inextricably linked. It is a crucial consideration when we remember that, according to Jesus, wherever even as few as two or three people are gathered together in his name, his non-physical presence will be there to guide them. It is people in a spiritual community, Jesus said, that he

would utilize as the *primary* instrument through which his presence and influence for good in the world would continue to be experienced. Unfortunately, the over-whelming significance of that possibility has not yet been grasped even by many folks today who claim to be his followers. There are numbers of good people who see being a vital part of the spiritual community we call church as an *elective*, something they can take or leave without any significant consequences. But is that *true*? We shall see.

During his ministry, Jesus himself demonstrated the *importance* of spiritual community by calling together twelve disciples to serve as a *model* for what we today call *church* (in Greek, "a gathering.") Then, after his death and appearances to his followers, they seemed obviously to have recalled his words about the possibility of his being with and continuing to guide them, so spiritual communities, later called churches, were born. They were simply a continuation of the spiritual community Jesus modeled when he called together the twelve and spent his life nurturing them into *greater maturity*.

But why is that important? Although we sometimes forget, Jesus gave us the reason. He said that the whole PURPOSE of his coming was to help us experience life in ALL of its fullness—which means he seems to have realized that most of us aren't experiencing fullness of life; and frequent missing out on that possibility affects not only us but the members of our family and everyone else we encounter. Also, people who "miss out" inevitably impact our life and hurt us! But here's the problem each of us faces: We may not even REALIZE that something is missing from our life. After all, it is hard to miss that which we have not yet experienced! Despite some really good times, we still have moments of unhappiness and times when our relationships are not so fulfilling as we would like. So, it is of overwhelming importance that we remember this: It is those unfulfilling aspects of life that many of Jesus' most important teachings address; and it is the spiritual community we call church that keeps alive and makes available those teachings which are so vital to our fullest wellbeing.

The truth is that, without being aware of it, each of us *hungers* for a more fulfilling life in *some area*—or in *some relationship*. But because we rarely think of what we long for as possibility having a *spiritual* basis, a felt need can go unmet through a person's entire life unless a tragedy occurs to wake us up. Yet, *underlying* hunger *persists*, even if we choose not to talk about it. We can *miss out* on God's intention for us to experience life in much greater fullness.

But here is the *good* news, so listen carefully: Jesus said, with both compassion and assurance, "Happy, fortunate are those who (*do*) hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they *shall be filled*," they *shall*, over time, be able to experience the fullness and wellbeing that they are missing! But how? Jesus' non-physical presence in even the smallest spiritual community will be available to help *assuage* our hunger and contribute to our overall wellbeing. But *actualizing* that potential gift is up to us. However, of course, the gift of healing through spiritual community can be and is often ignored or rejected.

Jesus reminded us that our openness *to receiving* greater fullness of life easily can be demonstrated by our "asking, seeking, knocking" (faithful commitment to a helpful process of becoming) within a meaningful spiritual fellowship. So, let us hear his words once more: "Wherever even only two or three are *GATHERED TOGETHER* in my name, I (my non-physical presence) will be there" to guide them into the more meaningful life God sent me to help make possible for them.

So, when we celebrate Easter each year, it is important to remember the vital reality that Easter brought into being: The Church, the instrumentality through which we are able to become connected to a higher, more meaningful quality of life. For Jesus, it was the *primary* medium through which God has chosen to communicate with us. And the New Testament tells us that all of Jesus' earliest followers understood that and passionately reminded us of the church to which Easter gave birth. The writers pleaded:

If you care about your own wellbeing or that of others, "do not forsake the assembling (gathering) of yourselves together." It's the crucial medium through which, over time, we become able truly to experience God's gift of a fuller life. During this special Easter season, may God help us to remember!

P.S.: Just last week someone told me that "some churches are flawed." "I think that is not quite true," I responded. "Actually, ALL churches are flawed!" Indeed, every human institution is flawed—and for good reason. because each one is made up of fallible, somewhat spiritually immature human beings such as ourselves, still in process of becoming. In this world, it would be necessary to avoid contact with all institutions and all people in order to avoid flawed individuals—hardly a practicable alternative! But Jesus seems to have understood that avoiding a church for that reason would make no sense. It is precisely that very entity through which our flaws (including yours and mine) are forgiven, our higher potential is nurtured, and, over time, that higher potential begins to be realized! The crucial qualification for a church is this: Make sure that the spiritual community of which you are a part is authentic. Look for a fellowship with pastoral leadership that has the training, experience, and depth lovingly to help people to get in touch with the unexplored potential already within themselves. If those significant ingredients are not there, look elsewhere. Quickly!
